

DECADE SPOTLIGHT

Renovated existing pools ...

In 2000, the Board approved the financing for the construction of the new Minisink Pool and game facility. The new larger pool was built to address the overcrowding at our other amenities. The new Minisink pool was dedicated at the beginning of the 2001 season.





In 2007, we broke ground on the new Island Pool and in July 12, 2008, it was officially open!

After 50 years of usage, in 2003, the lodge was vacated due to structural and environmental concerns.





The Lodge was constructed long before Arrowhead Lake Community Association came into existence. In the early 1950s Walter Robbins, owner of Robbins Door and Sash Company of Wilkes-Barre Pa, purchased what is now Arrowhead Lake and the surrounding property. He constructed the Lodge to entertain business guests. Subsequently tax laws changed and the Lodge became a less desirable business asset.

William Robbins, son of Walter, was a teenager in 1952 and recalls going to the Wilkes Barre railroad yards and helping unload Belgium blocks which were used in the construction of the grand fireplace. This is the closest dating of the original center portion of the Lodge. Unfortunately, the Wilkes Barre flood of 1972 destroyed all of the Robbins family records and photographs concerning Arrowhead Lake including those pertaining to the Lodge.

It contained the reception area, offices for all departments except sewer, storage for all departments, and the Manager's office. Board of Director meetings and committee meetings were held in the main hall as well as private functions. Other rooms were utilized as a T.V. Room, Pool Room with wet bar, Exercise Room, and storage for various clubs i.e. Garden and Arts and Crafts Clubs. In addition there was a three room apartment for emergency use (security snowed in etc).

The main Lodge building is a two story wood frame construction of an estimated 8,150 to 11,200 square feet with parking for 50 cars. The Lodge consists of this main center portion and two wings constructed at a later date. The majority of the building is constructed on an on-grade slab with no basement. The lower level consists of masonry walls and the upper section is timber framed. The upper level of the

center portion contains an impressive truss system supporting the roof and is the location of the grand fireplace.

After approximately 50 years of usage, the Lodge developed several structural and environmental concerns which caused then General Manager Howard Silkin to issue the following memorandum on February 8, 2003: "As of this date the upstairs of the Lodge is closed to any use. A large sag has been noted in the floor in the main room and must be inspected by an engineer."

Spected by an engineer." On February 17, 2003. Howard Slifkin issued a second memorandum: "Based upon the findings of the structural inspection performed or February 14, 2003, we hav determined that the Lodg should be vacated immedi ately... Please take all meas ures necessary to ensure the the structure remains vacate at all times."

The Lodge has been va cated since this memorandur denying ALCA of its main con munity center.

The new Welcome Center ...

On March 3, 2005, ALCA received the final permits for the construction of the new Welcome Center. A temporary trailer was placed in the parking lot until demolition of the old building and construction of the new building was completed. The Welcome Center, now called Member Services was completed and opened in December 2005 and brought the entire operational staff under one roof.



Hurricane Ivan causes damage...

The remnants of Hurricane Ivan dumped almost 7 inches of rain from September 17-18, 2004. This heavy rain caused Trout Creek to flood ultimately collapsing the Owassa bridge. Owassa Drive at Trout Creek was closed for a year as crews worked to restore the bridge. Exactly one year later, September 17, 2005, the Trout Creek Memorial Bridge was dedicated to the brave men and women in our military and police and fire departments.



Phil and Dori Whitehurst

Phil and Dori Whitehurst started playing pickleball during a visit to the Villiages in Florida about 30 years ago. They heard a strange noise and investigated to find people playing a very strange game that resembled tennis but on a smaller court. They borrowed paddles and balls and were hooked ever since. When they returned to their home in Havertown, they found a group of players and started to grow pickleball in their community They were successful in growing to over 100 people and eventually gaining township support to convert tennis courts into pickleball courts.

Then, 8 years ago, they moved to Arrowhead Lake and they met Leah Tierney who had brought pickleball from Havasu, Arizona. With her, they began playing at Minisink using the tennis nets which are taller than pickleball nets. Gene Melleno, a high school physical education teacher, volunteered to coach them and they started tournaments on weekends. Lessons were provided by Gene to kids, adults and families. A few years later, they approached Elmer Money about playing indoors at the clubhouse. Unfortunately, then the clubhouse was torn down.

Dori talked up pickleball at every recreation committee meeting. They continued to play at Minisink on tennis courts. Arrowhead gave them 4 temporary nets. About five years ago, the Minisink courts had to be resurfaced. DPW painted the lines required for pickleball and Rich Chung persuaded Arrowhead to buy us four sturdier nets on wheels that are moved into place on the tennis courts when we play pickleball 7 reserved mornings a week. The nets are there whenever anyone else wants to play. Now, Minisink is a combination tennis/pickleball facility and ALCA community members of all ages have been joining in the pickleball events!
